Bruce Judd is the head of Bruce Judd Consulting Group based in Seaside, Florida, which provides economic development consulting services with growth and revitalization strategies. Mr. Judd was appointed by the U.S. President to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, that oversees national preservation matters, such as the preservation for the White House and Capitol. Bruce has served as a member of the National Trust for Historic Preservation Board of Trustees and has directed over 250 projects for historically significant buildings.

Lionurd Tynes is a member of the City of Daytona Beach Historic Preservation Board and served on the committee of the Black Heritage Trail project. The Trail highlights 18 sites in the Black Heritage Trail booklet which records many African-American accomplishments or historically significant sites in Daytona Beach. The publication was inspired by Daytona Beach native and first African-American Mayor Yvonne Scarlett-Golden.

Pratt Cassity is Director of The Center for Community Design and Preservation in the College of Environment and Design at the University of Georgia. Mr. Cassity has served as Executive Director of the National Alliance of Preservation Commissions and has worked with the National Trust for Historic Preservation on numerous projects. Mr. Cassity teaches graduate courses in Historic Preservation, Landscape Architecture and Planning.
